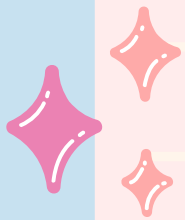


"GUCCI":

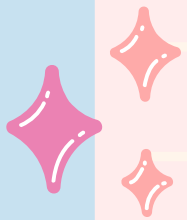
